

ARPA Funded Trail Improvements



We are very thankful for the ARPA funding allocated through the county to provide much needed improvements to the Chautauqua Rails to Trails. Work was done over the summer to improve drainage on the trail in a number of needed areas.

At the Ralph C. Sheldon Jr. Trail parking lot off of Summerdale Road near Mayville, the parking lot was muddy and needed fresh gravel. The pictures below are the before and after pictures showing the improved parking lot.



Also, on the Ralph C. Sheldon Jr. Trail near Nettle Hill Road, the pictures below show the before and after of the work that was done. The area was reditched to improve the drainage of the chronically wet section, and the part of the trail near the road was resurfaced.



The pictures below are the before and after of the Alison Wells Ney Trail near School Street in Brocton. This is the start of further improvements that will take place to the trail segment between School Street and Route 20 to reduce the number of wet spots and overall trail experience.



The pictures below show the before and after of the Nadine and Paul Webb Trail near Morris Road in Mayville. Numerous drainage and reditching work was done to begin the improvement of that section. Especially in the spring and fall, the section used to have numerous puddles.

Fincher Trail Resurfacing

Resurfacing of the James C. "Jim" Fincher Trail Segment was done this summer between Route 430 and Honeysette Road near Mayville. This trail segment is named in honor of Chautauqua Rails to Trails President Emeritus Jim Fincher.

Prior to the resurfacing, the section of the trail closest to Honeysette Road had a few chronically wet areas over the past few years and we are happy to report that even after a lot of rain storms the trail remains nice and dry.

Before the re-surfacing began, new culverts were added and the trail has been re-ditched and regraded to improve the water drainage in the area.

We are very thankful for the support from The Sheldon Foundation, The Chautauqua Region Community Foundation, and our members for their support of this major project to improve this trail segment.

New Trail Kiosks

Trailhead kiosks are common at most trail systems in New York State and throughout the country. However, until this past summer, the Chautauqua Rails to Trails did not have any trailhead kiosks to provide information and maps to its trail-users. Fortunately, we were able to work with the Chautauqua County Partnership for Economic Growth (CPEG) to allocate some funds from the American Rescue Plan Act to purchase materials for four trailhead kiosks. Two of the kiosks have already been built and installed and can be found on the Webb Trail, just behind Boxcar Barneys in Mayville, and on the Fincher Trail, about 250 yards south of Route 430 in Mayville.

In cooperation with the Chautauqua Lake Central School District and the Southwestern School District, we worked with Principal Rachel Curtin from Chautauqua Lake Central School to have the kiosks constructed and installed by students and teachers from local school districts. This initiative gave the students a

sense of ownership over the project and provided them with hands-on experience that translated directly back to our community. We are expecting to install the remaining two kiosks this fall at the Titus Road and Summerdale Road trailheads. Additionally, we plan to work this winter to create new metal maps that will provide trail users with a sense of direction and will update our kiosks to match what trail-users expect to see at a modern trail head.

We hope that you enjoy the kiosks as much as we enjoyed working with Principal Curtin and all of the students who participated in this wonderful community project!

Carroll Area Nature Trail Update

After several years, and with the support and help of many people the Carroll Area Nature Trail is ready! This new 2 mile trail runs between Riverside Road and Main Street(Route 62) in Frewsburg, NY. It is for non-motorized use for activities like hiking, biking, and horse riding.

This trail would not have been possible without the generosity of John Lobb for allowing a parking area and the trail on his property.

We are very thankful to the support of the community and neighboring property owners Mark Gage and David Bloomquist that have supported the trail development, and Chautauqua Rails to Trails President Emeritus Jim Fincher for making calls and visiting with members of the community to garner support for the proposed trail.

Work on the trail began two years ago by Trail Construction Associates. A thank you goes out to Greg Snow and Paul Mosher for their initial work on the trail, and for brush hogging this spring.

After a permit was obtained through the DEC, Mike Simanow, a local contractor helped with the last push of the trail and we appreciate his help with getting us to the finish line.

A special thanks goes out to JMI for providing discount material to make the project economically feasible.

The main parking area is at the John Lobb trail head, right behind Lobb's Auto Service Center at 129 West Main Street. Please drive through the gate and park out back by the Carroll Area Nature Trail sign. Feel free to stop in and say thanks to John Lobb, or better yet, get your car repaired or oil changed while you take a hike. There is room for 8 to 10 cars to park there.

At Riverside Road, there is a spot for a car or two at the trail entrance that is approximately 800 yards east of the Audubon Community Nature Center.

Adjacent landowners who wish to use the trail corridor to travel to their property should contact Chautauqua Rails to Trails.
